




1. Supporting participation in the carbon market

 Engage with land managers to assist them with documentation of cultural value of fire management and select a monitoring framework to enable co-benefits valuation.









- Golden-shouldered Parrot habitat









- Southern-Laura/Cooktown








Southern Cape York EDS burning

 Land and Sea Program grant






Northern Cape York EDS burning

Cape York Indigenous Fire Management Network

• To build on networks developed during previous Indigenous Fire Forums held on Cape York



About

This project involves the establishment of a North Queensland Indigenous Fire Management Network, and the implementation of an Indigenous Fire Mentorship Program for its members. As part of the Network, Indigenous fire practitioners will participate in sharing knowledge on cultural burning practices and fire management for the conservation of species and ecological communities.

Timeframe 2018 -2023

Project objectives

This project will increase knowledge and awareness of:

- Indigenous Ecological Knowledge (IEK)
- How cultural fire management can conserve littoral rainforest, ant plant and cassowary habitat
- The value of combining IEK with scientific and conservation approaches, and Indigenous capacity building.



Project activities

- Establishing and coordinating the North Queensland Indigenous Fire Management Network
- Implementing an Indigenous Fire Mentorship Program for Network members
- Working with the Network to establish cultural burning regimes for littoral rainforest, ant plant and cassowary country, and
- Sharing and implementing IEK to improve the management of littoral rainforest, ant plant and cassowary country.

Project outcomes

By 2023, the North Queensland Indigenous Fire Management Network will be established and delivering an Indigenous Fire Mentorship Program. Participation in this Program will increase the knowledge and capacity of Traditional Owners to implement cultural practices across Cape York's littoral rainforest, ant plant and cassowary country.





Context

- This project forms part of Cape York NRM's Biodiversity Bright Spots Rainforest Resilience: Caring for Littoral Rainforest and Coastal Vine Thicket, Ant Plant and Cassowary Country in Cape York project.
- Threats to littoral rainforest, ant plant and cassowary habitat include clearing of native vegetation, coastal development, visitor disturbance, weed invasion, animal grazing/browsing, fire, storms and cyclones, climate change and fragmentation.


