They first became interested in feral pig control when staying on the Atherton Tablelands and seeing 16 feral pigs grazing on a cow pasture. After trying several variations of homemade traps with trail cameras to capture the results, Graham found the BoarBuster on the internet. He traveled to the United States to secure two. In the past three years, GPS Trapping has caught 356 feral pigs in FNQ, where they cluster in small sounders. Of these, 265 have been with the BoarBuster. They have also done a project tracking feral pigs with GPS ear tags and have amassed a wealth of knowledge about feral pig control.

Simon was the first soil conservation officer appointed by the Qld Public Service since the Resource Management Division of the old DPI was combined with the Lands Dept to make the first iteration of the Dept of Natural Resources in 1996. Simon's passion is to improve northern Australian landscapes with a particular focus on grazing land management principles and reclaiming degraded land. He believes soil is the foundation of our grazing industry's productivity and environmental sustainability. Simon grew up on the Atherton Tablelands and has experience working on cattle stations, natural resource management bodies and now with the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries.

Professor Ben Hayes is a cattle geneticist with extensive research experience in genetic improvement of livestock, focusing on integration of genomic information into breeding programs. He is the author of more than 250 journal papers, featured in Nature Genetics, Nature Reviews Genetics, and Science, and in 2018 was named one of the most influential agricultural researchers in the world.

In 2019 he was appointed Centre Director for Animal Science within the Queensland Alliance for Agriculture and Food Innovation, a University of Queensland research institution. Professor Hayes is a co-inventor of genomic prediction and is the leader of the Northern Beef Genomics Project.
